

President's Message

October is always a wonderful month for Airedalers! First we have Montgomery weekend, which actually used to be just a weekend. The Devon and Hatboro shows were held on Friday and Saturday, and then on Sunday the Airedale Terrier Club of America held its National Specialty and Sweepstakes at the Montgomery Kennel Club's All Terrier Show.(Hence the name "Montgomery weekend.")

Over the years, obedience and agility events have been added and now the "weekend" begins on Tuesday with all Terrier agility trials, and continues throughout the entire week with all Terrier and Airedale only obedience and rally events. When the weather is good it is a sublime event. When the weather is bad, and it can be very, very bad, it is still a sublime event but a challenging one! Showing dogs in pouring rain or 5 inches of mud (that year was nicknamed Mudgomery) takes incredible fortitude and dedication. Actually, spectating under those conditions takes the same qualities! Still, every Airedale admirer should try to include at least one trip in his lifetime to the events of that week. It is an amazing adventure.

The weekend after Montgomery was our Airedale Square, held after Airedale judging at the Catonsville Kennel Club dog show held at Howard County Fairgrounds. Having come on board as your President rather unexpectedly, I didn't get to the powers that be to request a later judging time for Airedales. So we were assigned a 9 am judging time, and with only 5 Airedales entered, judging wasn't going to last very long! With Airedale adaptability, we decided to opt for a BRUNCH rather than our usual lunch, and we all got together at 10 am with a delicious combination of breakfast casseroles, bagels, sweet rolls, fruit, coffee and so much more! Nora Dudman did her usual outstanding job of organizing, setting up, seeing to it that everyone had plenty to eat, and then breaking down and cleaning up afterwards. The food was delicious and there were many new faces among the attendees, all of who had such a good time that they are applying for membership to the ATCMW! And Pam McKusick and Ed Burns set up and manned the table for the rescue sales items.

October was also a good month for our Rescue Committee's fund raising activities. After I got home, I started my youngest dog, a clickertrained lab, on the box work. At first, he kept looking

back at me, wanting me to click on something. Finally, he gave up on the clicker and strolled around the boxes until he found and took the dried liver. Even after a number of successful trials on that first day, he was still puzzled, still looking for a click, but I didn't help him. I waited several days (that wonderful doggie incubation period) before I tried again. This time he hurled himself onto the deck where I had set up the problem and immediately began an independent search with real purpose. Still, when things got difficult, he tried to extract clicks from me. He'll get over that. Meanwhile though, Cleo Airedale never asks questions; just goes to work.

If you introduce problems at the right pace, you will find that a lot of very interesting thinking goes on in your dog's head. I'll just give one example. I distributed some boxes around the yard outside our kitchen porch and hid some salmon in a box behind a trash barrel. Cleo didn't find that box searching on the ground (there was little breeze to help her), but she went back to the other end of the area, up the kitchen porch steps, stood there with nose raised and nostrils vibrating for several seconds, then down the porch steps at the opposite end from the hide, calmly walked back to a point below where she had been standing on the porch; then went directly around the right barrel and took the salmon.

A word of warning: I've just touched the surface here, so don't use this little article as the basis for starting your dog. For more about nose work, see the National Association of Canine Scent Work website www.nacs.net.


